The site is a tremendous asset to our heritage tourism goals and I hope you get a chance to explore it in depth and share it with your network.

I am pleased to be able to present to you the Trust's 2021 Annual Report which features their incredible year of progress.

I leave it to the Trust to continue this tremendous work in 2022, and I want to thank them and all of the members and supporters who are our partners in preservation. We are being entrusted as the guardians and tellers of our own history and I know we won't let future generations down!

Greetings!

It's hard to imagine that another year has passed, and we are still experiencing the effects of the pandemic. However, we did not let the pandemic get in the way of awarding more than \$15 million in historic preservation planning, capital, and heritage tourism projects in 2021.

We were delighted to see so many outstanding projects worthy of support from the Preserve New Jersey Historic Preservation Fund. The Trust is looking forward to seeing these initiatives come to fruition. In between Covid emergencies, a number of organizations were able to bring their projects to completion and several held ceremonies to mark the occasion.

This past year we highlighted the Trust's ability to fund municipal and county planning initiatives. For government entities wanting to focus efforts on protecting resources closer to home, our planning grants can fund such initiatives as masterplan elements or historic resource surveys. For 2022, we increased the maximum planning grant from \$50,000 to \$75,000 considering that prices have risen over the years, and we expect this increase will enable more comprehensive thinking in planning projects. In addition, our traditional historic preservation, heritage tourism, and capital projects will continue to be offered in this upcoming grant round.

The Trust continues to foster heritage tourism through its grant program and the continued development of the Journey Through Jersey website. Many new visitor-ready sites were added this year and we plan to offer themed itineraries to aid the heritage traveler in exploring New Jersey's historic sites.

For the first time and out of necessity, the annual history and historic preservation conference was held virtually over three days in June. While this method proved to be a lifesaver for the event, we hope to meet in person next year on June 3, 2022 at the Trenton War Memorial. Plans are already underway and we look forward to actually seeing friends and colleagues in person after so much time.

Through the corporate business tax dedication, funding for the Preserve New Jersey Historic Preservation Fund has been robust. The Historic Trust is grateful to be in a position of supporting so many of New Jersey's irreplaceable treasures so that future generations will benefit from our past.

Throughout the year, the Historic Trust staff helps to plan and support educational workshops and conferences that reach the history and historic preservation audiences. The Trust participated in several events including the League of Municipalities, the New Jersey Conference on Tourism, New Jersey Highlands Coalition, and Q&A with Preservation New Jersey. In addition, the Historic Trust's board members regularly attend events that celebrates a project's milestone, such as a ribbon cutting or groundbreaking. This year,

2021 CONFERENCE

After two years, the 2021 History and Historic Preservation Conference was held virtually for the first time. The conference was

held on three consecutive Thursdays in June. The dynamic program featured three keynote speakers including Paul Edmondson, President and CEO of the National Trust for Historic Preservation, and nine sessions focusing on three crucial themes: Advocacy and Preservation, Underrepresented Histories, and Climate Change and Sustainability. Once again, "Building a Place for History" received generous financial support from over 50 sponsors, many of whom were showcased on the conference website and recognized during sessions.

Awards of Recognition

Glenn Ceponis, received not one but two Awards of Recognition this year! Historic Preservation Continuing Education

The Historic Preservation Continuing Education Program at Rutgers University-Camden was launched in 2016 through a partnership between the New Jersey Historic Trust and the Mid-Atlantic Regional Center for the Humanities (MARCH). Designed for those who desire to gain a deeper understanding of the vocabulary and discipline of historic preservation, students learn from professionals working in the field to gain a more realistic perspective on how the tangible remains of our past can be integrated within current environments. In 2017, the program began offering a Certificate in Historic

Preservation, and in 2021 the program presented two full semesters of courses. Select courses provide American Institute of Architects (AIA) continuing education credits through a partnership with Preservation New Jersey. For more information, visit: <u>www.preservation.rutgers.edu</u>.

CHANGING FACES AT THE TRUST

In 2021, we said farewell to Erin Frederickson. Erin joined the Historic Trust in 2019 as a program officer. During her service, she managed numerous preservation planning and capital projects, notably the Battleship New Jersey in Camden and Lucy the Elephant in Margate. We are grateful for her expertise in architectural survey, compliance, and Sandy related issues. Erin left the Trust at the end of the year to pursue her passion and accepted a position with the New Jersey Historic Preservation Office as a Historic Preservation Specialist.

2021 also gave us new staff members and a new board member!

Lisa Easton, AIA, is the Trust's newest board member. Ms. Easton has worked on the restoration of some of the New York Metropolitan Region's most noteworthy landmarks. She has developed a reputation in the historic preservation field as an expert architect, planner, and historian. Her work consists of commercial, institutional, and residential projects set within urban and sub-urban settings. She teaches, lectures, and serves on a variety of non-profit boards, promoting the integration of architecture and preservation.

Ashley Parker officially joined the staff in April after serving as the Program Assistant since January 2019. She is a graduate of Monmouth University with a Masters in Anthropology. She joined the staff as a program officer, administering and promoting heritage tourism grants and special initiatives. Over the years, Ashley has been greatly magnifying our social media presence and expanding our outreach capabilities.

Judith Murphy, AICP, PP, is a licensed Professional Planner and a member of the American Institute of Certified Planners. She re-joins the staff as a Program Officer after serving the Township of Moorestown as their Principal Planner. Her experiences in local government, grant management, and professional planning will be influential in the administration of our new Municipal Planning Projects.






GRANT PROGRAMS COMPLETED PROJECTS

PRESERVE NEW JERSEY HISTORIC PRESERVATION TRUST FUND

The Preserve New Jersey Historic Preservation Fund was established by legislation in 2016 to provide an annual source of matching grants from the state's corporate business tax for historic preservation projects. The Preserve New Jersey Fund continues the work of the Garden State Historic Preservation Trust Fund (2000-2012) and the Historic Preservation Bond Program (1990-1997). Since 1990, more than



\$180 million in matching grants has been awarded to worthy historic preservation construction and planning projects throughout the state.

Three categories of grants are awarded through the program. Historic Site Management and Heritage Tourism Grants, up to \$50,000, help support planning exercises that promote effective management and interpretation at historic sites. Capital Preservation Grants, up to \$750,000, help support construction expenses related to the preservation, restoration, and rehabilitation of

historic properties and associated architectural and engineering expenses. In 2021, \$2,248,373 was reimbursed for construction and planning activities. The following 7 capital, 10 planning, and 4 heritage tourism projects were successfully completed and closed out in 2021:






PRESERVE NEW JERSEY HISTORIC PRESERVATION FUND AWARDED PROJECTS Historic Site Management (HSM), Heritage Tourism, and Capital Level I & II Grants

In 2021, the New Jersey Historic Trust awarded over \$14 million in matching grant funds to 69 preservation planning and capital projects in 17 counties. Funded projects included National Register nominations, preservation plans, conditions assessments, design and construction documents, restoration, rehabilitation, and other projects that assist organizations in managing and stewarding their heritage buildings and sites. In addition to the 2021 Preserve New Jersey grant applications, the next phase of funding for two 2019 multi-phase capital projects was allocated. Together, these two multi-phase capital projects total \$1.5 million, which brings the total amount for funds recommended for the 2021 ground to \$15.5 million. The following grant awards were made in 2021:

In February of 2017, the New Jersey Historic Trust launched journeythroughjersey.com, the first website dedicated solely to promoting heritage tourism in the state and to supporting and improving quality visitor experiences at the state's many and diverse historic sites. The development of the awardwinning website arose from the needs identified in Linking our Legacy to a New Vision; A Heritage Tourism Plan for New Jersey, published by the Trust in 2010. This master plan documented the untapped potential for a robust heritage tourism sector and outlined the steps necessary to achieve that goal.


In 2021, Trust staff worked closely with the Department of Military and Veteran Affairs (DMAVA) to integrate military sites and expand the NJ in Conflict theme. As a result, over 30 military sites were added to the Journey Through Jersey website! In addition, Journey Through Jersey continued to accept site nominations throughout the year. In 2021, 12 historic sites were nominated and added to the Journey Through Jersey website representing all the themes identified in the 2010 master plan.




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EASEMENT HIGHLIGHT

In 2021 the New Jersey Historic Trust acquired seven historic preservation easements protecting eleven buildings at Fort Monmouth, a former military installation located in Oceanport, Monmouth County. Each of the buildings contribute to the New Jersey and National Register-listed Fort Monmouth Historic District. Each of the buildings was constructed in the Colonial Revival style following plans by the Army Quartermaster Corps.

Fort Monmouth was established in 1917 as Camp Little Silver, later named Camp Alfred Vail and in 1925 it received permanent status and renamed Fort Monmouth in recognition of those who fought at nearby Monmouth Courthouse during the Revolution. Fort Monmouth played a significant role in the

Army Signal Corps and specifically wireless communication and training. The period of significance for the historic district extends from 1927 to 1940, when the Signal Corps Laboratories began relocating to other locations.

Fort Monmouth closed in 2011. The Fort Monmouth Economic Revitalization Authority (FMERA) was charged with redeveloping the base. The NJ State Historic Preservation Office (NJ HPO) conditioned the sale of properties located within the Fort Monmouth Historic District to include placing historic preservation easements on sold parcels. The NJ Historic Trust worked with NJ HPO, FMERA and the individual developers in developing preservation easements on the following buildings:

Allison Hall built in 1928 as a hospital building and later converted to offices. Plans call for the building to be rehabilitated into office space.

Scriven Hall built in 1929 as Bachelor Officer's Quarters will be rehabilitated as residential units. Gardner Hall (1931) and an associated garages will be rehabilitated as residential units.

The former Guard House (1935) later converted to a firehouse will be converted to a restaurant.

Kaplan Hall was built in 1933 as the camp theater and was later converted to a communication museum. Current plans are to convert back to a theater.

Buildings 205 through 208 were constructed in 1927 as enlisted men's barracks. These will be rehabilitated as residences.

Building 287, an additional enlisted men's barracks, was constructed following similar designs in 1940, will be used as offices.



The Mission of the New Jersey Historic Trust is to advance historic preservation in New Jersey for the benefit of future generations through education, stewardship and financial investment programs that save our heritage and strengthen our communities.

The Historic Trust seeks to achieve its mission by serving as:

- A leading voice for preservation at the state level.
- A catalyst for preservation and community revitalization activities.
- A full partner in state policy development.

The Trust also provides financial support, protection and technical assistance through its programs:

The **Preserve New Jersey Historic Preservation Fund** was established by legislation in 2016 to provide an annual source of matching grants from the state's corporate business tax for historic preservation projects. Eligible applicants include nonprofit organizations and government entities. The Preserve New Jersey fund continues the work of the **Garden State Historic Preservation Trust Fund** (2000-2012) and the **Historic Preservation Bond Program** (1990-1997). Since 1990, over \$180 million in matching grants has been awarded to worthy construction and planning historic preservation projects throughout the state.

The **Discover New Jersey Historic License Plate Fund for Heritage Tourism** provides grants up to \$5,000 to develop and promote visitor-ready sites as heritage tourism destinations.

New Jersey Cultural Trust Capital Preservation Grants protect and improve historic properties that are used by nonprofit organizations that have history, humanities and arts programming. Grants may fund projects for stabilization, repair, restoration, adaptive use, and increased accessibility. Funding is offered on a schedule provided by the NJ Cultural Trust, which also qualifies eligible organizations.

The Historic Trust offers long-term, low-interest loans through the **Historic Preservation Revolving Loan Fund** for the acquisition, preservation, rehabilitation, or restoration of historic properties.

An **Emergency Grant and Loan Fund** has limited funds for critically needed work on endangered historic resources. Currently only loans are available.

The **Preservation Easement Program** ensures the preservation of privately-owned properties in perpetuity using deed restrictions. The Trust initiated the first statewide program of this kind, which enables easement donors to take advantage of charitable deduction tax benefits.

The Historic Trust accepts donations of real estate through **New Jersey Legacies**. Property donors may realize significant income and estate tax benefits by their donations. Donated properties are resold by the Trust with protective easements to ensure their preservation.

NEW JERSEY HISTORIC TRUST BOARD & STAFF

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Lisa Easton, AIA, Hunterdon County

Ms. Easton has worked on the restoration of some of the New York Metropolitan Region's most noteworthy landmarks. She has developed a reputation in the historic preservation field as an expert architect, planner, and historian. Her work consists of commercial, institutional, and residential projects set within urban and suburban settings. She teaches, lectures, and serves on a variety of non-profit boards, promoting the integration of architecture and preservation.

Janet W. Foster, Morris County

An architectural historian and historic preservation consultant, Janet W. Foster is a proponent of New Jersey and its vernacular architecture. She lectures and writes on the topic. She serves on the Madison Borough Historic Preservation Commission, and on the NJ State Review Board.

Deborah Marquis Kelly, Mercer County

Ms. Kelly is a former executive director of Preservation New Jersey and since 1996 has been an independent historic preservation consultant through her company, Preservation Partners. She is the co-author of the New Jersey Women's Heritage Trail, the current secretary of the Chesterfield Township Historical Society, and immediate-past Chair of the Chesterfield Township Historic Preservation Commission.

Peter Lindsay, PE, Sussex County

Mr. Lindsay has more than thirty-eight years of professional experience in engineering and holds a master's degree in Mechanical Engineering from New Jersey Institute of Technology. Mr. Lindsay participated in the structural stabilization project of the Hamburg Presbyterian Church's 1868 sanctuary. He is a member of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War and several classic car clubs in addition to professional organizations.

Kenneth A. Miller, Morris County

Mr. Miller is retired from the financial services industry, and serves in several volunteer positions, including treasurer of the Joint Free Public Library of Morristown and Morris Township Foundation. He has been involved in preservation as a Commissioner and Chair of Morristown's Historic Preservation Commission, as well as restoring his private residence, a National Historic Landmark.

Katherine Ng, LEED AP, Burlington County

Ms. Ng is the Vice President of Wu & Associates, a general construction firm who has received widespread recognition for their restoration and preservation work from notable sources including the National Trust for Historic Preservation, state agencies, and local preservation organizations. Holding a Master's in Psychology from the University of California, Los Angeles, Ms. Ng's focus centers on the integration of culture into the fabric of sustainable community growth.

Meme Omogbai, MBA, CPA, CGMA, Somerset County

Named one of 25 Influential Black Women in Business by The Network Journal in 2010, Ms. Omogbai has been a leader in the nonprofit, corporate, museum and government sectors. As the first American of African descent named Board Chair of the American Alliance of Museums (AAM), Ms. Omogbai co-authored its ground-breaking strategic plan, The Spark, and led the initiative to rebrand the AAM as a global alliance. As Co-Director, Interim CEO, COO, CFO and Trustee, she led a major transformation in operating performance at the 105-year-old Newark Museum.

Chris Perks, PE, Camden County

Mr. Perks is a professional engineer and construction manager who has worked on many historic projects including comprehensive renovations of the Philadelphia Academy of Music, the Philadelphia Water Works, and fifty-three Philadelphia Free Library buildings, with fifteen historic Carnegie Libraries. He served on the Camden City Historic Preservation Commission and is the president of the Camden County Historical Society.

Patricia Anne Salvatore, Cape May County

Ms. Salvatore founded, developed, and preserved/restored two history sites as nonprofit museums: Historic Cold Spring Village (where she currently serves as executive director) and Naval Air Station Wildwood Aviation Museum. She is a leader locally and regionally in promoting historic preservation, history education and heritage tourism.

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
